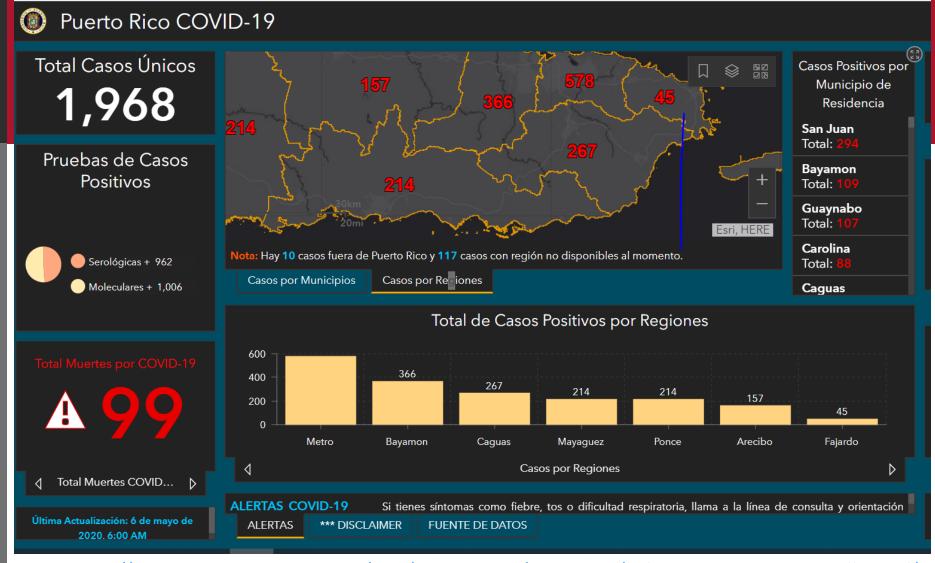

TAKE-AWAYS SESSION #4 **Elba Aponte**, PR Teachers Association

Current situation:

- March 13th First curfew in PR & school closings
- There has been a falling behind and a lack of continuity in the public schools of Puerto Rico. There has been no strategic plan since the Department
- PRDE decides to move to pass all students from their grade and close the school year early.

Challenges:

- There has been a lack of access to internet, lack of access to computers, and lack of parental support
- There has been no continuity of services for children with special needs
- There has been **emotional deterioration of teachers and parents** that is why the decision to close the school year early is the right one
- Passing all students discredits the teacher's moral authority to demand effort from their students – there was worry regarding this decision
- There was a consideration for students who did not have the means to continue their education

Response Proposals:

- **Deliver internet equipment** to teachers and students
- **Reinstate** special education therapies in the summer
- Create remedial courses for small groups
- Previous grade tutoring for all subjects upon return to class
- Design online educational modules for all units and subjects
- Create educational capsules of essential subjects and offer announcements periodically
- Educational Camps
- Start first three weeks with reviews of the previous grade

Early academic closure - means falling behind in skills

- Disparities between municipalities due to late start of the school year in February, March or schools that could not reopen
- Lack of skills can affect the period of adjustment to the school routine

What will happen in the summer?

- 20,000-25,000 computers and tablets will be sent in June, including the license of textbooks on computers
- PRDE is considering summer classes
- There must be a strategic plan to address the gaps identified in the evaluations upon return
- Remedial courses should be given to students who are falling behind create partnerships organizations external to PRDE for tutoring
- Reconsider the academic load of the teachers who will have different levels to respond to

Accessibility and availability of services

- Open forums like YouTube and Zoom should be considered
- Network access is limited in some geographic locations
- New teaching opportunities for teachers given the lag behind

What steps will be taken to return to school?

- Improvement in school facilities
- Social-emotional reinforcement plan, remedial modules, interactive forums for parents and students, teacher training, program design for planning schools for continuity of online education

PREF – Path to the GOAL:

- The greatest challenge is academic performance PREF made a diagnosis of the challenges to improve teaching practices – Pilot in Bayamón
- Virtual Notebook Initiative 65% student participation
 - Online educational resources for parents, teachers, students

Challenges/Recommendations

- **Student health and safety:** Ensuring student food & Creating policies and practices to prevent contagion in schools
- Ensure continuous learning: Access to distance education and special education & respond to academic lags and have contingency plans
- Teacher profesional developent: Training to provide distance education and intervention for lags
- **Teacher and student mental health:** Remote services for vulnerable students & support to respond to trauma

Literacy in grades K-3

- Students with reading difficulties are 4X more likely to drop out of school
 - Study with the Department of Statistics PR 2011-2015
 - 85% of K-3 students live in poverty, 25% are chronically absent
 - 12% of 1st graders are held back and 40% of 3rd graders do not achieve reading proficiency

- There have been many disruptions in the last 3 years Maria (2017), school closings (2018-19), earthquakes and COVID-19 (2019-20) for the youngest K-3rd graders, this has serious implications
- In general, academic progress is lost during the summer, and low-income students are the most impacted

Priorities for K-3 Teaching

- Provide opportunities for the continuity of education including alternative means to the internet
- Assess reading levels when schools reopen and prioritize core curriculum areas and core skills
- Comprehensive professional development for teachers
- Ensure health of students and families including food security You can't learn hungry

Food security

- Family First Coronavirus Response Act gives districts flexibility to distribute food.
- Almost 300,000 students receive food at school and need to continue receiving it
- The People's Social Taskforce has asked to reopen dining rooms

Limitations of current response:

- Donations that have been made so far only cover the equivalent of 10 days of food since March 30th
- Today, non-profit organizations are held responsible
- Lack of clarity in communication with families on how to receive food

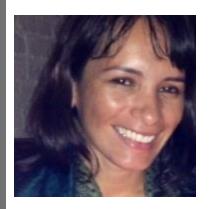
